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Message from the Interim Pastor:

March 2025

"The Cross"

Dear Members and Friends of Redeemer and St. Theodore of Canterbury,

Saint Paul wrote to the Church in Corinth that "the message about the cross ... for those of us being saved is the power of God." He went on to say, "I have decided to know nothing among you except the crucified Christ Jesus." He repeated those thoughts when he wrote to the Galatians that the primary message he came to bring was "the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ" by which the world was saved. As the Season of Lent is about to begin, we too will again spend time contemplating the necessity of the cross of Jesus. One of questions we will ask is this: "Do you have a cross or a picture or an image or a memory of a particular cross that has had an impact on your life?"

March is going to be a wonderful month filled with opportunities to gather for worship, inspiration, community and collegiality. At the same time, there will be a number of special times together to observe the disciplines of Lent.

March has five Sundays and four of those, beginning with March 9 through March 30 are the first four weeks of Lent. The biblical reading and the sermons during those weeks will focus on Jesus' journey toward the cross, where he sacrificed his life for the forgiveness of our sin and the eternal salvation of the world.

One of the long-standing traditions of the Lenten Season within many Christian traditions is the mid-week gatherings during those six weeks. The theme we have chosen this year is *†CrossWays.* We will gather, starting on Ash Wednesday, March 5th, for a Holy Communion service. Also, during the worship, for anyone so desiring, we will offer the imposition of ashes, either upon our foreheads or on the back of one of our hands.

On this month's Wednesdays following Ash Wednesday, March 12, 19, 26, we will gather at 4:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall downstairs for a 50-minute time of inspiration from Scripture, music, and devotional moments focusing on the cross of Jesus. During those gatherings, attendees sitting at round tables will have an opportunity to share with others at their table the meaning and the power of the cross in their lives. At each gathering, one person from our congregation will share a five-minute story about the way a particular cross has had an impact on their life. At 5:00 p.m., we will share a meal together and enjoy the friendships and community of all who gather for those events. All are always welcome. We hope to see you there! And into the first two weeks of April, this same pattern of gathering will continue throughout the remainder of Lent.



Message from Our President...

Dear Members and Friends,

It has been a busy month for our Church Council, and quite a few decisions have been made. Many thanks for these dedicated members.

We decided to hire a janitorial service for \$140 a month and a gardener for \$200 a month to give our hard-working volunteers that have been doing this work some well-earned time off. The janitor will clean once a month, alternating between spending the major amount of time in the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall. The gardener will come 2-3 times a month. These figures were not figured into the 2025 Budget that was approved, so the accounts for these items will have a negative balance.

The Fire Department did an inspection, and we are required to replace 10 of our Exit Signs, as they don't fully light up. New bulbs would not improve that situation, so new signs have been

purchased. Many thanks to our members, Ray Friedrichsen and Emil Miorelli who have said they will install the new signs for us.

Carol and Mickey Costello, along with Bishop Finck, have volunteered to represent us at the Pacifica Synod Assembly on May 16 and 17. Wendy Alfageme has also volunteered to be one of two alternates. We will ask for any other volunteers at the Congregational Meeting, and will then vote to approve all of our representatives.

The Council passed a motion to purchase two tables that will be placed behind the last pew to hold any church material that needs to be passed out, clipboards, cards, and possibly the name tags.

We have been approached by a National Prayer Group to use our conference room once a week for an hour, and we will be meeting with them to ensure this would be a group that follows our teaching.

We are so happy that Carmen Leslie has agreed again to chair our Spring Bazaar on May 1 and 2. We will be following the same format as the Holiday Bazaar except we will be offering lunch for sale.

Karen Ford graciously agreed to represent us at the Spring WELCA Luncheon March 1. Someone from the Women of the ELCA would like to speak to our congregation regarding this special program.

Susan Avila and Doris Weinert have been researching Thrivent, and the ways we, as members, can bring more income into our church. They will be giving a short talk on how we can accomplish that at the Congregational Meeting.

March 16 we will be having a Memorial Lunch remembering Dee Sessa hosted by Juanita Townsend. The church will be providing tableware, coffee and tea. There is a sign-up sheet to help with the setup on March 15, and to serve and cleanup on March 16.

Our Lenten Season begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5 at 10:30 am with Holy Communion and Imposition of Ashes. We then will have Lenten Devotion and Supper at 4:00 the following 5 Wednesdays; March 12, 19, 26 and April 2 and 9. We are also planning an Easter morning brunch. There are sign-up sheets to help with the suppers, and brunch. As we get closer to Easter, there also will be a sign-up sheet if you would like an Easter Lily.

I know there are so many sign-up sheets over the next few months, and I hope you can find some way to help, and thank you in advance for volunteering.

<u>Outside Memorial Cross Wall</u>



The Council has been discussing a way to honor members, friends, family, and other loved ones. It was decided to turn one wall of the Outside Cross Chapel into a Cross Memorial Wall. Currently we will be placing a cross and plaque for Pasto Gil. The Church is providing the plaque and the Moore family have chosen a cross. We will also be putting up a plaque and cross for Jerry Brady with a donation provided by Jerry's family. We are opening this up to our membership if they would like to include a loved one

on this wall. Because we do want to keep it somewhat uniform, the Church will order the plaques but you will have options for the symbol on it of a Lutheran Rose, an Episcopal Flag (like the one on the bench for Betty Hobbs in the Cross Chapel), a simple Cross, or no symbol at all. We also have appropriate options for a cross to be hung if you do not want to go through finding and ordering your own. The suggested donation if you provide the cross is a minimum of \$150.00 or if the Church also provides the cross the suggested donation is \$200.00. The Church will place the cross and plaque on the wall. If you would like more information about this project, please feel free to speak to the Council President, Kay Pushman.

"Lent"

March 2 – Transfiguration of Our Lord The Gospel Lesson is from Luke chapter 9 verses 28-43

Third Sunday of February is the last Sunday after Epiphany. It is the Transfiguration of Our Lord Sunday. We began the time after Epiphany with the Baptism of Jesus and ends with the Transfiguration of Jesus. The presence of the Trinity on both occasions includes the Father claiming Jesus as His own and giving us directions to listen this time! How did Peter, James, and John react? Fear but wanting to stay on the mountain. To dwell here. Instead, Jesus brings them down the mountain and tells them not to speak of what happened – until after the resurrection. This is one of the issues when you decide to become a follower of Jesus – what we want to do verses what Jesus want you to do. The "yes" to follow the call comes with a price: usually involving pain and sacrifice but definitely fear and confusion. We don't get to hang out on the mountain top with God; we have to go down and deal with the nitty-gritty of reality and people. Which brings us back to being Salt and Light to the world.

It's Lent again! It was a long time coming this year, but Lent is finally here! I love Lent. Really. I love the lessons, I love the solemnity, I love the hymns, I love the fact that there's not a lot of hoopla surrounding it, I love the encouragement to give and do more, I love that people pray more, I love the disciplines, most especially I love that it's a time to slow down and reflect.

March 5, 2025 – Ash Wednesday

The Gospel Lesson is from Matthew chapter 6 verses 1-6, 16-21

On Ash Wednesday we begin the season of Lent; we hear from the Gospel of Matthew. This Gospel lesson is a continuation of the Sermon on the Mount. In it we are given the outline of how we should live Lent, and the rest of our lives. We are called to do righteous deeds, give alms, spend time in prayer, fast and thereby build treasures in heaven. Jesus also gives us the warning: don't do these to show off; don't brag about what you do; do it simply, in our ordinary everyday lives, looking only for God to approve.

Sunday, March 9, 2025 – First Sunday in Lent

The Gospel Lesson is from Luke chapter 4 verses 1-13

The second Sunday of March which is the First Sunday in Lent, we, again, have one of those great understatements in the Gospel: "... was led by the Spirit into the desert for forty days, ... During that time, he ate nothing, and at the end of it he was hungry." (Lk. 4:2). One may think, gee, Jesus is God therefore if he follows the Holy Spirit nothing could go wrong. Oops. Not quite. Jesus goes into the desert to prepare for his ministry and there meets the devil who then proceeds to tempt him. The temptations that Jesus faces are the same general ones that we face: material comforts being foremost in our life; to achieve power and influence for our own purposes; being dependent only on ourselves and prideful in our self-sufficiency. This Gospel lesson brings into direct view those ideas and wants that are in direct opposition to the actions that we are called to do on Ash Wednesday. It is a good guideline for what to do

(righteous deeds, give alms, spend time in prayer, fast, build treasures in heaven) and what not to do (seek material comforts, power, and influence, be prideful) as we journey through Lent.

March 16, 2025 – Second Sunday in Lent The Gospel Lesson is from Luke chapter 13 verses 31-35

The second Sunday of Lent we have a foreshadowing of Jesus' own death and resurrection – 3 days reflection – "*I cast out demons and I perform healings today and tomorrow, and on the third day I accomplish my purpose.*" (*Lk. 13:32*). Jesus also laments over Jerusalem. It ends with a call for all to recognize that the Lord sent him: "*Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.*" (*Lk. 13:35*). During this time perhaps we can more fully recognize who Jesus was and is and will ever be.

March 23, 2025 – Third Sunday in Lent

The Gospel Lesson is from Luke chapter 13 verses 1-9


The third Sunday of Lent we have a call to repentance and a reminder that we need to bear good fruit. This Gospel lesson also addresses that idea that bad things happen to sinners – and even worse things if they are big sinners. Jesus reminds us about a couple of important things in his response: we are not to judge others, suffering has a purpose, obedience to the will of God should be foremost in our actions. And about that bearing fruit, please note: there is no limit to when this bearing of fruit ends. In fact, there is the implication that if that tree stops bearing fruit there is a very real possibility of it being uprooted.

March 30, 2025 - Fourth Sunday in Lent

The Gospel Lesson is from Luke chapter 15 verses 1-3, 11b-32

The last Sunday of March we begin with the accusation of Jesus eating with sinners; which is true! Jesus came for the sinners and outcasts. That was <u>one</u> of his purposes. It continues with the story of the prodigal son. In this story, a man gives one of his sons half of his treasure. The son then goes and spends it all. Then goes through bad times before deciding to return to his father and ask for forgiveness. The father not only forgives him, welcomes him back as his son, and throws a party for him. The other son is a bit jealous of all this attention lavished on the "bad" son. How often do we share those feelings? How often do we cry, "not fair" when we learn about good things happening to "bad" people? How often do we limit God's forgiveness and mercy? But the father's response is a reminder to us all that we do need to be grateful for what we have: for the people in our lives, for the relationships we have and built over years, for the love we have shared.

During this month let us look at the mountains we need to climb to encounter Jesus. What obstacles do we need to overcome? What do we place in front of ourselves that keep us from the pinnacle of the mountain? How are we planning to spend this Lenten season? How are we responding to the call to do righteous deeds, give alms, spend time in prayer, and fast? What temptations keep you from responding? Where are we encountering Jesus in our daily lives? How are we presenting Jesus to others? What fruits are you growing? How are you planting and cultivating your own little patch? How are we asking for God's forgiveness and mercy? How are we sharing it with others?
